

MICHIGAN PEDESTRIAN LAWS: GUIDE FOR THE PUBLIC

A "pedestrian" is anyone on foot. Also considered pedestrians are people on skis, skates, or rollerblades; in a wheelchair; riding a horse; or using a horse and buggy.

PEDESTRIANS





Violating any of the laws listed below could result in a ticket.

Pedestrians should always be sure to cross safely and not impede traffic.

- Freeways in Michigan are not for pedestrian use.
- If crossing signals are available, cross only on a "Walk" symbol.
 - » If the "Don't Walk" symbol appears while you have partially completed crossing, you should continue to cross and proceed to a sidewalk or safety island.
- ◆ If a sidewalk is available, use it.
- If a sidewalk is not available and there is no choice but to travel on a road, walk or roll facing traffic and stay as far to the left as possible.
- ◆ The normal flow of traffic should be maintained without pedestrians blocking, obstructing, or barricading a public street.
 - » This does not apply to public utility work.

MOTORISTS



Violating any of the laws listed below could result in a ticket.

- Yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians in crosswalks.
 - » Drivers are required to yield the right-of-way in all instances to avoid a crash.
 - » Blind pedestrians are not required to carry a cane or use a quide dog or other quiding aid.

Motorists should be extra cautious when any pedestrian is present. They are one of the most unprotected roadway users.

- Stop before a crosswalk or an intersection.
- Obey the speed limit, and travel at a speed that is safe for road conditions and stopping distances.
- ◆ Adjust your speed when pedestrians are present.
- Obey traffic signals, signs, and markings.

MOTORISTS continued



 Report to law enforcement any crash that injures or kills any person or damages property of \$1,000 or more.

Violating the law listed below could result in a ticket OR AN ARREST.

 Use precautions to keep a person using a wheelchair or other mobility device safe at a crosswalk or any other pedestrian crossing.

GENERAL "RULES OF THE ROAD"







- Give law enforcement only authentic and accurate identifying information.
 - » While it is not a requirement to have a driver's license as a pedestrian, a law enforcement officer may stop and detain for purposes of identification any person when there is a reasonable suspicion that a crime or violation has been committed.
- A police officer who witnesses a violation may make a traffic stop and issue a ticket to anyone observed breaking the laws listed to the right.
